The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners.

The month was called 'January' because the Romans named it after their god Janus – depicted as having two faces – one looking back at the old year with regret, and the other face looking forward to



the New Year with hope. The Romans understood that at the start of a new year we cannot help but be hopeful of improvement. Maybe you look back at 2024 with sadness. Maybe you see failure in the old year. And so now, looking into 2025, you have a desire to do some things differently. So how can we truly experience a fresh start this New Year. There are some things you need to do according to St Paul.

Firstly, if you want a fresh start, then you must forget the things which are behind. 'But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind...' If you hope to change, there are some things in the past that you need to forget. You need to forget about your failures. You need to confess them before God and move on. God has promised forgiveness if we ask. At each service of Morning Prayer the words from The Book of Common Prayer of St John reminds us 'If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to

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cleanse us from all unrighteousness.' If you want to succeed, you have got to let go of the past!

Secondly, not only should you forget those things behind you but focus on the things before you 'straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.' As Christians, it ought to be our desire to serve the Lord the very best we can! Serving the Lord with all our might is the greatest way we have of worshipping Him, and then He is able to use us to do great things for him – that is the third element of St Paul's desire that we should fulfil those things that are beyond us. 'Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own.' (Philippians 3:12)

Looking back, we are certainly thankful for all the Lord has done, but we must focus on what lies ahead of us, and God is well able to do exceedingly more than all that we could ask or think!

Do you need a fresh start? Three things you need to do..... forget the things that are behind you...focus on the things that are before you.....and ask God to help you fulfil the things that are beyond you. In doing so 2025 can and will a great year for St Macartin's, but we all must play our part in the life, worship, work and witness for Almighty God.



'The Longest Yarn' exhibition crafts stories of wartime liberation in Enniskillen



From 14th January until Friday, 7th February, St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen, is honoured to be the only venue in Ireland hosting The Longest Yarn, a three-dimensional wool tapestry and touring exhibition telling the story of the 80 days between D-Day and the Liberation of Paris in the summer of 1944.

This beautiful artwork's story is told in this new video interview with the creator of the exhibi-

tion, Tansy Forster who is originally from Northern Ireland – and Dean Kenneth Hall, who serves as Rector of St Macartin's and Dean of Clogher. *The Longest Yarn* draws its name from the 1962 film *The Longest Day*. Enniskillen is famous for being the only town in the British Isles after which two regiments were named – the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers and the Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards.

The display, carefully knitted and crocheted by hundreds of volunteers worldwide, depicts various scenes to tell a story of this momentous time in history. The total exhibition measures 80 metres, representing the 80 years since D-Day.

The tapestry was first unveiled at Notre Dame Church in Carentan, France, on 28th May 2024 and has been touring cathedrals in England before arriving in Enniskillen ready for opening to the public from Tuesday, 14th Jan-

uary. It took over 1,000 people knitting and crocheting from countries across the world, including the UK, USA, Australia, New Zealand, Canada and France to create the intricate scenes.

Psalm 148



Psalm 148 seems to fit neatly at the end of the final book of psalms, with its invitation to praise and all of the reasons it gives to praise the Lord. A closer reading however reveals that there is much more here than initially meets the eye. The final psalms are inclusive in their scope, inviting all living beings

to worship; but here we have something even more inclusive, perhaps the peak of the psalter's inclusivity, where everything alive and inanimate from the depths of the earth to the highest points of the firmament, is invited to praise. And here we learn something rather important about God's great cosmic plan of salvation: it's not only for us. Redemption is also offered to the whole of creation, animals, birds, fishes, rocks and hills, rivers and trees: we are united with the whole universe in the great final transformation of everything,



and it's up to us to make sure that our worship reflects this! Perhaps even more it's up to us to make sure that our lives reflect this: our care for creation and our awareness of our place, as only some of the creatures of the Creator, should shape our day to day decisions about our use of resources, the impact our lives have on the non-human and more-than-human created beings around us. And this psalm teaches us that a key part of our life of praise is in doing this: fulfilling our functions in life, whatever they may be. We all have a call to follow, to serve, to glorify in whatever it is our hands find to do. Here we as hu-



mans can vocalise the praises of those parts of creation which cannot speak for themselves.

So here is a much more complex psalm that it might at first seem. Here we see that our God is involved in every part of creation, the animate and inanimate, the breathing and the lifeless, and here we see that all of creation can and does worship the Lord, with humans having a special role in that worship and special responsibilities both in work and worship.




