The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

On Thursday 6th June we will hold a special service in our Cathedral to mark the 80th Anniversary of D-Day (see full details on pages 8 and 9).

Wars and violence lead to unimaginable levels of



many who did she never talked much about it. It is only now I question the reason why she didn't, and it is all too late to get that answer! In his poem 'To Any Dead Officer', Siegfried Sassoon refers to the incredible sacrifice made during the First World War in order that we may live and "work in peace with Time for friend". The peace that was brought about by the end of both World Wars was a peace built upon the sacrifice of millions. An anniversary like that of D-Day helps to ensure we never forget that peace is built upon sacrifice.

Sadly we take the sacrifice of the many men and women who served in the Forces during the Wars for granted. We too easily forget the price of the peace we enjoy. The ability to remember is a wonderful gift that God has given to humankind. Some of our memories are happy and we can recall wonderful experiences, but some of our memories are sad and we may weep as we remember them. Even though the Second World War ended 79 years ago and the First World War 106 years ago - it is important that we remember that many still bear the scars of war today from those events and

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more recent, like Iraq and Afghanistan, our own troubles in Northern Ireland, Ukraine and the conflict in the Middle East. These thoughts of sacrifice should bring us back to the ultimate sacrifice that Jesus made for us all on the battlefield of Calvary.

St John put it well when he said "Greater love has no one than this, that one lays down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). Jesus gave his life not only for his friends but also for his enemies. As God, Jesus had no need to experience human suffering, but he did for all our sakes. The evil of humans – what we call sin – has separated us from God. Jesus died to reconcile us to God, by dying in our place – the Perfect One for imperfect ones!

I'm told that immediately after World War II ended the churches were full of thankful people, but the sense of thankfulness soon faded. In Northern Ireland during the Troubles, churches of all denominations were well attended - maybe people needed that sense of commitment or belonging. Many people experienced their "exodus" of freedom from the fear of the oppressor and entered their "Canaan", but many forgot their deliverer!

Let us determine with God's help to make this Remembrance of D-Day a milestone when we:

- Remember with gratitude those who made possible our deliverance; when we:
- Rejoice in our freedom and prosperity; and when we:
- Reaffirm our commitment to live responsibly as followers of Christ.



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D Day Commemorations



D Day Commemorations

Enniskillen is joining communities around the Country in commemorating the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings in Normandy, France on June 6th 1944. D Day was an incredible achievement in military planning and logistics and by the day's end, over one hundred and fifty thousand Allied troops had successfully stormed the now famous Gold, Juno, Sword, Utah and Omaha beaches to achieve a toehold in France. In the weeks that followed, the Allies fought bitterly against a determined foe to liberate Paris two months later. This military operation signalled the beginning of the end of World War Two. We should all remember the selfless sacrifice and courage of all those involved in D Day and beyond and this 80th anniversary provides a wonderful opportunity to pay our tribute to those who gave so much to secure the freedoms we all enjoy today.

County Fermanagh was a training base for D-Day and thousands of US Soldiers, mostly young men, were based here prior to D-Day. Over 20 US and RAF bases were located in Fermanagh during WW2, including Castle Archdale, Killadeas, St Angelo, Crom Castle and Celtic Park. Approximately a quarter of Fermanagh's population was American military personnel towards the end of the Second World War and such was the strategic importance of Fermanagh that both General Patton and General Eisenhower both visited Enniskillen in early 1944 to ensure that their soldiers were ready and prepared for D-Day.

A special community service to mark the 80th anniversary of D Day will take place in St Macartins Cathedral on Thursday 6th June at 8pm. This service will also celebrate the 75th anniversary of the local County Fermanagh Branch, Royal Air Forces Association (RAFA). The service will particularly remember the service and sacrifice of thousands of our own military personnel as well as the thousands of US soldiers who trained in Co. Fermanagh during WW2 in preparation for the Normandy Landings. Following the service there will be a Beacon lighting ceremony in the grounds of St Macartin's Cathedral.

The County Fermanagh Branch RAFA are dedicating in the service new cords for their standard which will signify their 75th anniversary. These cords have been donated by the Eames family in memory of Bill Eames, a former President of the County Fermanagh Branch. Before joining the Royal Air Force in WW2 Bill attended Enniskillen Model School, Portora Royal School and St Macartin's Cathedral. His name is proudly recorded on the Cathedrals WW2 memorial. On D Day, Flight Lieutenant Eames, from Enniskillen, piloted a plane towing a glider into Normandy.

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

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Knowing your Cathedral - The East Window

The Church has taught since ancient times that Eden was in the East, and that the second coming of Christ will happen in the East, and so the special significance of this cardinal direction for church buildings is marked in many ways. In St Macartin's Cathedral we have a splendid East Window which draws on this tradition by depicting four scenes of resurrection from the Bible. Our curate, Revd Edwin will be writing about each of these scenes over the coming months.

Reading the window from north to south the stories show a sense of progression: from someone just dead, to someone being buried, to someone who has been in the grave, to Christ himself, dead and resurrected.

The second panel depicts the story of the raising of the widow of Nain's son. Luke tells this story of how Jesus reaches out to the multiplymarginalised in compassionate love. It is perhaps indicative of the limits of human capacity



that while we have words for widow and orphan, few cultures have a word for bereaved parents. This woman found herself occupying two of these categories: widow and, now, bereaved parent. Her links to her society were weak already, and were now almost lost altogether. She would not only be a widow with no children, she would be destitute, and forced to survive on charity. We are not told the details of her son's death, his funeral is already in progress as the story opens. Funerals in the Holy Land in the time of Jesus were rather different from what we know today. The funeral happened much sooner after the death. usually within a day, and the funeral procession was a loud and often boisterous affair, with the screams and wails of professional mourners, and musicians. It is per-




haps Christ's first miracle in this story that he is able to bring this noisy procession to a stop. The raising to life is so characteristically understated and so touching. It is followed by one of the most beautiful verses in any of the gospels: 'Jesus gave him back to his mother.' Once and for all the question is settled as to whether God cares about people's lives, and we see that the marginalized hold a particular place in God's heart.
