The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

Christmas Day and Easter Sunday are two days in which many people who are not regular parishioners attend church, however there are many more who only attend for baptisms, weddings and funer-



als. Why do we go to church? Why do we worship God? The excuses and attitudes of people, who do not attend church, are interesting to say the least. Excuses are truly amazing! Excuses are much like a rocking chair: it gives you something to do but doesn't take you anywhere!

Yet, for many, worshipping God is pure joy. It is a normal part of their lives. God's presence is as familiar and natural as breathing. They come to church enthused about worshipping God and being with His people. They do not come because of the clergy, or the music, or the people. Their main motivation is to meet with and worship God. If you get in the right attitude and motivation you too will enjoy coming to church.

David speaks of this in Psalm 84. This Psalm was apparently written when David was forced to leave Jerusalem during Absalom's rebellion, and David was distressed about leaving God's House. David had a strong desire for God's House - "How lovely is your dwelling place, O Lord Almighty! My soul yearns, even faints, for the courts of the Lord; my heart and my flesh cry out for the living God." (verses 1,2).

Today, more than anything else we need God's presence. Worship provides strength for the day -"Blessed are those whose strength is in you" (verse 4). We gain strength from God's presence and fellowship with His people. The more you desire to come to the house of worship, the stronger in faith you will become. Conversely, the more you stay away, the weaker in faith you become. There is nothing mystical or magical about that. It's a fact of life. Worship is not just a spiritual "warmer" on Sunday morning. It is God's people actively responding to him. Worship is not a spectator sport. Worship is not something done to us or for us, but by us. Time spent in worship with the Lord strengthens your inner spiritual being. Be faithful to the Lord and His Church, and watch yourself become strengthened spiritually.




The Ascension – Thursday 9th May

While He was blessing them, Jesus left them and was taken up into

heaven.' (Luke 24:51).

The Ascension is a hugely neglected festival, which deserves to have a bigger place in our church life. How do we understand it?

The Ascension tells us that Jesus is in control: 'Jesus has gone into heaven and is at



God's right hand' (1 Peter 3:22). Jesus occupies the top spot in the universe; the control of our world is in the safe, scarred hands of Jesus. We can offer Him our worship and allegiance, knowing that His plans are better than those of any Prime Minister or President.

The Ascension tells us that God is committed to His world: 'And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with Him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus' (Ephesians 2:6). Jesus did not leave His humanity behind when He ascended, for we are raised with Christ to heaven. Therefore, God is bound to His world and we can trust Him to fulfil His purposes for our lives and world.

The Ascension gives us a job to do: 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations' (Matthew 28:18,19). God's way of working in the world is through us. He commissions us for this task at the Ascension and equips us at Pentecost. We are called to make disciples, starting in our workplace, family and community.

'Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which He looks compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which He walks to do good. Yours are the hands through which He blesses all the world.' (Teresa of Avila).





Know your Cathedral - The East Window



The Church has taught since ancient times that Eden was in the East, and that the second coming of Christ will happen in the East, and so the special significance of this cardinal direction for church buildings is marked in many ways. In St Macartin's Cathedral we have a splendid East Window which draws on this tradition by depicting four scenes of resurrection from the Bible. Our curate, Revd Edwin will be writing about each of these scenes over the coming months.

Reading the window from north to south the stories show a sense of progression: from someone just dead, to someone being buried, to someone who has been in the grave, to Christ himself, dead and resurrected.

The first panel depicts the story, which is found in all three synoptic gospels, of the raising of Jairus's Daughter. This twelve year old girl was


brought back to life after her father's pleas to Jesus, and her story perhaps more than anything else reminds us of the nature of suffering, and how this it is the same, regardless of status. Jairus is a leader of the synagogue, here a representative of the leaders of society, of the status quo. Jairus not only approaches Jesus but kneels before him to plead his cause: he reminds us that life happens: people get sick and people die, regardless of their positions, their accomplishments or their wealth. Christ listens to his pleas, and acts on them: the incarnate Word is deeply interested in human life and death, living and dying. Christ visits the house of the death, and in the glass of the window we see the moment where he reaches for the dead girl's hand and raises her to life.

Of course what the window does not depict is the story that is so closely interwoven with this one: that of the woman who had been bleeding for all twelve years of Jarius's daughter's life. And through Jesus's actions there is more than one gift of new life in this story: more than one resurrection. Jesus heals her as well, bringing her back into the community from which she had been banished, and her life can begin again. Jesus was forbidden by the rules of religious purity to touch either of these women, but in breaking those rules con-



quered death and brought new life.

Going from Strength to Strength



The Parenting Wellness Group had their first gathering on 9th April 2022. There were three families in attendance and they enjoyed a lovely chat with a representative from The Aisling Centre who focused on the very importantance of Self-Care for parents. Fast forward two years, there are now sixty-one families in the group. This group gives parents and children an opportunity to come together, once per month, to communicate and support each other. Examples of

activities over the past two years have included the following: Yoga, Gymnastics, Games/Sports, Art Lesson, Mindfulness and Art/Craft, National Trust Walks, Clay Workshop, Messy Play, Healthy Eating, Visit to CAFRE, Afternoon Tea, Parenting Tips, The Sand Box, Oakwood Bushcraft, Connecting with Horses, Movement to Music, Groove and Glide Roller-skating and Hip Hop Dancing.

The sessions always end with tea/coffee, snacks and lots of chatting!

This is what some who attend say: "It has brought together parents from different walks of life in a welcoming and safe environment, where parents and kids can be together and interact with each other in a safe space. It reduces the feeling of loneliness and builds new connections between families that otherwise would not be possible without this project. Linda is a super host that puts so much heart in every single event and I am so grateful for her dedication and patience that it takes to make all this happen! Thank you." "The project gave families within the community the opportunity to meet and get to know one another in a relaxed environment. We also gained very helpful information."

The Parenting Wellness Group will meet on **Saturday 18th May in St. Macartin's Cathedral Hall at 2.00pm.** Two representatives from The Police Service of Northern Ireland will be in attendance. This will be an interactive workshop to include topics such as Road Safety, Crime Prevention, Internet Safety and more! Refreshments provided afterwards. 
