



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The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners.

Harvest is a time of thanksgiving to God for all His provision for us. It is good to cultivate a grateful heart, and studies have shown that people who practise thankfulness tend to have a more positive



outlook on life, be more optimistic about the future, and are generally healthier than those who do a lot of grumbling and complaining. On one occasion Jesus met a group of ten lepers (Luke 17:11-19). They called out to Him in a loud voice asking for Him to have pity of them, which He did. He sent them to the priest, and on the way they were healed. However, only one of them returned to give thanks to Jesus, and he was a Samaritan. He threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked Him, giving praise to God in a loud voice.

It occurs to me that most of us make a loud noise when we are in need of help, but we are much quieter about giving thanks. We are not inhibited when making our needs known to God but how many of us make a point of giving Him thanks when we have received His help? Do we come to church regularly and sing praises loudly? Do we speak of what blessings we have received? If God is generous to us are we generous in return with our weekly giving to God's House?

Why not try and cultivate the discipline of gratitude in your life? Make it a rule to thank anyone who helps you in some way, or who encourages you.

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Let them know you appreciate them. Review each day before you sleep, reminding yourself of every good thing that happened, and offering your thoughts to God as a prayer. Introduce a short time of giving thanks to God each Sunday in church before the service. It is good to chat to each other at church (I am all for that) but remember our primary reason for coming to church is to thank and to praise God.

Rather than focus of what you do not have, or what has gone wrong, train your mind to focus on what you do have, and what has gone right. You will be surprised at the difference it can make. So for this Harvest Season and the coming days let us be people of 'positivity' rather than people of 'negativity'!

Of all we have or receive the most precious thing is that God blesses us with an abundance of love, may we share that love with each other.

Diocesan Review Consultations

Wednesday 9th October in the Hilliard Room at 7.30pm

The purpose of the consultation is to listen to the views of parishioners on four key themes relevant to their parish. These are; the present, the future, Christian outreach, and administration / support. This will include reflecting on current patterns of ministry, Sunday service arrangements and governance responsibilities. Parishioners' insights into these themes are needed to help us look inwards, outwards and across the diocese and thus scope out the future.

It will be important for as many parishioners as possible to come along and contribute. Each meeting will be structured and led in such a way as to make it easy for participation and allow discussion. This is not just for Select Vestry members – all parishioners are invited to come along and take part.

Alongside these consultations there is an online survey running. This survey will run from 16 September until 7 October and is easily accessed by clicking on the QR code published on P63 of the September edition of the Diocesan magazine.

We are arranging a separate consultation with clergy and we would request that clergy do not attend the parish meetings. Whether we realise it or not, clergy presence can affect the openness of discussion in a variety of ways. The Review Team members leading the consultation will set clear ground rules for the meetings and will insist on respectful discussion.

My early days

As many of you will already know I was born in Enniskillen and grew up on the family farm in the nearby townland of Mountdrum Lisbellaw. My journey in the Christian faith began when my parents (James & Linda) presented me for baptism in St Macartin's cathedral in December 1996. The cathedral has in every sense become my second home. I have such fond childhood memories of attending services with my family, taking part in nativity plays and exploring the faith at Sunday School.

University Days & Past Employment

After completing my A Level studies at Erne Integrated College, I accepted a place to read Theology at Queen's University Belfast. I graduated with a 2:1 bachelor degree in June 2017. I entered into employment at Fermanagh & Omagh District Council soon after my studies. Over the years I have held various positions within the council, but a particular highlight of my past employment was assisting the Community Wellbeing Team Leader with the delivery of programmes for local communities.

Call to Ordination

I felt the call to ordination from an early age. It was during my confirmation in the cathedral by the now Archbishop Michael Jackson (Dublin and Glendalough) that I began to realise that the Lord was calling me into His service. After a few years of quiet contemplation, I approached Dean Kenny who encouraged me to continue on with my academic studies and if the call

The last seven years as St Macartin's Parish Reader and Student Ordinand have been the most enjoyable and purposeful experiences of my life! I have such an affection and love for our parish community, who are an absolute joy to serve and worship alongside. I will always be grateful for their acceptance.

Over the past year, I have been able to put my training in St Macartin's cathedral into practice all over the Clogher diocese. My extended Sunday residencies at Inishmacsaint Parish Church (Derrygonnelly) and Clogher Cathedral Group have also been a fantastic part of my training. It has been lovely travelling throughout Clogher Diocese, making new friends and sharing my thoughts in the Sunday sermons.

Under the practical and spiritual guidance of Dean Kenny I have gained confidence and have been so well mentored in church leadership. I could have never done it without him and I will always be thankful for the support he has given me over the years. If I am half as good as him in my own ministry, I will be happy.

Ordination

During the final nine months of training for entry into ordained ministry, I will be researching management of Irish Cathedrals (COI) in conjunction with a parish internship. All being well I hope to be Ordained



in June 2025 and I am willing to serve anywhere in the Church of Ireland (North or South of the border). No matter what the future holds for me I will remain hopeful and continue to try my best.

Sunday Lights and Café



Sunday Lights and Café, at which we use interactive and creative forms of teaching to help the children learn about the Christian faith (telling Bible stories, discussion, songs, games, and crafts) resumed on Sunday, 29th September. The children leave during the 11.00am service, after the singing of a family hymn for their own activities, and will attend and take part in monthly Family Services. Sunday Lights is open to anyone in P1-4, and Sunday Café welcomes children in P5-Year 8.

Family Services

The next family service is on Sunday 27th October. The key to understanding these services is thinking about them as 'family time' (the family of the Church), not as time for the children with the adults present. It is an all-age time - all are welcome to attend these services!



The Psalm

Psalm 70 is regularly on our lips, whether we know it or not. The opening litany of both Morning and Evening Prayer quote from its terse petitions, and for good reason: Psalm 70 provides perhaps one of the most adaptable sources of invocation in the whole Psalter. The author is experiencing that feeling of exclusion that any



of us can have, at a party, at school, at work, heaven forbid, at a church. We can feel others are talking about us, laughing at us and mocking us, even when they're very often not. And yet we have all known the feelings that make the psalmist pray for the shame and confusion of enemies, for the help of God. Our powerlessness in time of crisis is part of what makes us human, part of what turns us to God, part of what shapes our lives and our relationships. And so it's no surprise to remember that we usually read Psalm 70 in Holy Week, where the taunting 'Aha aha' of verse 3 recalls the mocking of the crucified Messiah: the powerlessness of the humanity of the Christ, the isolation, the pain, the feelings of abandonment that were only intensified by the jeers of the people standing around. Such is the pain of the sentiment that the BCP translation leaves it out altogether. And yet it is not left at that.



At the halfway point the psalm has a turn: fear is replaced by rejoicing, just like the Messiah's triumph over death in Holy Week. The mocking disappears and the glory of God shines through. The Psalmist remembers to seek God as much as make petitions. Too often when we are overwhelmed our prayers become rather like shopping lists: catalogues of needs and wants. This tempting strategy does little to soothe us or remind us of our place in God's thinking. When our prayers however turn to seeking and praising God then we remember what

sort of God we worship and how we feature in God's mind, how we can receive God's love. Psalm 70 is testimony to the ways in which that crucified Messiah embodies the role of the suffering servant of God, but the suffering servant who fully trusts God. Ion the midst of all its pain and complaint, all its pleading, Psalm 70 reminds us just how God's sovereignty is shaped: in the power of suffering love.

Confirmation 2025

A Service of Confirmation will be held in St Macartin's Cathedral on Sunday 2nd March 2025 at 11.00am. If you are School Year 9 or above and have not already registered please collect a registration form from the Cathedral Office and register now.



1. What is Confirmation?

Confirmation is the rite at which those who have been baptised seek the

blessing of the Holy Spirit for their growth as Christians. The confirmation candidates first confirm the promises of their baptism. Then the bishop lays hands on them, praying that God's Spirit will confirm, strengthen and guide them to live out their faith in their everyday lives.

2. Why Confirmation?

As children we often adopt our parents' beliefs and practices but as we grow older we develop our own opinions and beliefs. This is part of the transition into adulthood, which is marked by many different stages – moving to secondary school, becoming a teenager, wanting to choose our own styles of clothes and music. In the Christian faith there is also a stage of transition when young people may feel that they want to make their own declaration of faith and commit their life to Christ. This transition is normally marked by confirmation. It is a service in which the young people confirm for themselves, and publicly before



family, friends and the wider Church, the promises made on their behalf at their baptism. However, confirmation is not just something for teenagers but can take place whenever an individual desires to make a faith commitment. Sometimes young people come before they reach their teens and others come as adults.

3. What happens at Confirmation?

The candidates renew their baptismal vows before the bishop; and as in baptism, the congregation is asked to support the candidates in their life of faith. The bishop then asks each candidate by name, 'Do you ... believe and

accept the Christian faith into which you are baptized?'

The candidates then affirm their faith, together with the congregation, in the words of the

Apostles' Creed. After this, they kneel before the bishop, who lays hands on each one, praying,

'Confirm ... O Lord, with your heavenly grace, that he/she may continue to be yours for ever, and daily increase in your Holy Spirit more and more until he/she comes to your eternal kingdom. Amen.'



4. How is Confirmation related to Holy Communion?

Holy Communion or Eucharist is when Christians draw especially close to God. In some parts of the Anglican Communion individuals who have been baptised do not have to be 'confirmed' to receive Holy Communion. In the Church of Ireland, admission to Holy Communion has usually presupposed confirmation.

5. What happens after Confirmation?

By making a public affirmation of faith the candidates take responsibility for themselves as members of Christ's Church. When the bishop asks, 'Will you proclaim by word and example the good news of God in Christ?' and 'Will you seek and serve Christ in all people, loving your neighbour as yourself?', the candidates respond, 'With the help of God, I will'. This demonstrates both their commitment and their recognition of their dependence on God to live a Christian life.

Garden of Remembrance Stone Cross


The Garden of Remembrance has now been enhanced with the erection of a stone cross. As a result of improved access it has been possible to create two separate plots with a central dividing path. A stone cross, separating the two plots, was erected to the Glory of God at Easter 2024. It was the gift of the Rev Canon Desmond Kingston MA, Chaplain of Portora Royal School 1970 -2006



The cross is made in the style of the stone cross on Eniskeene Island, situated upstream of Killyhevlin in the River Erne. Over the years Eniskeene has had numerous spellings, the most common being Inishkeen, However, St Macartin's uses the spelling taken from the inscription on the oldest piece of Communion silver in the cathedral. The inscription on the Davis chalice reads as follows: Poculum Ecclesiae Parochialis de Eniskeene ex dono Eduardi Davis generosi, anno 1638.

Knowing your Cathedral

Translated from the Latin this reads as: The Cup of the Parish Church of Eniskeene, the gift of Edward Davis, Gent., in the year 1638. Eniskeene was the ancient name of the parish of Enniskillen. Dioceses were established in Ireland from the twelfth century. Parish boundaries were then set for administrative purposes, which included arrangements for the collection of tithes. Inishkeen or Eniskeene was one of the twenty-five parishes listed in the Clogher Diocese in the fourteenth century. The Protestant church in Enniskillen, now \$t Macartin's Cathedral, adopted the ancient parish boundaries in the seventeenth century which extended from Eniskeene to the border of County Fermanagh, beyond Clabby.




The Garden of Remembrance is now marked not only by the stone cross and signage, explaining the cross's significance, but also by a marble plaque on the boundary wall.

The creation of the Garden of Remembrance for the Burial of Ashes has been a great success. Those who wish to have their cremated remains buried close to their place of worship can now make arrangements to do that. There is a 'Garden of Remembrance Fund' if anyone would like to contribute to it.


This new cross, erected by the Rev Canon Kingston, will be dedicated during the service on Sunday 29th September.

Choral Scholarships

If you have the talent and interest, you can help to form an integral part of St Macartin's Cathedral Choir, Enniskillen, and benefit from our new choral scholarships.

The Cathedral Choir sings at the weekly Sunday morning service at 11.00am, and occasionally at additional services throughout the year. Once or twice a year, the Choir visits churches and cathedrals further afield, to sing. Each year, commencing in September, St Macartin's offers up to ten Choral Scholarships; ideally at least two of each voice part (Soprano, Alto, Tenor, Bass). It is useful, but not essential, for potential Choral Scholars to have relevant experience of singing in a choir, for example a church, school or community choir. For all Scholars, good sight-reading skills are desirable.

There are three types of scholarship available: Choral Scholar (Fulltime), Choral Scholar (Part-time) and Organ Scholar.

- Fulltime Choral Scholars receive an annual scholarship of £500 to assist with costs of tuition.
- Part-time Choral Scholars receive an annual scholarship of £250 to assist with costs of tuition.
- Organ Scholars receive an annual scholarship of £100 to assist with costs of tuition and have use of the Cathedral Organ for practice purposes provided the cathedral is available at the time and prior booking of the organ for practice has been made. Organ Scholars will also receive some introductory sessions from the Cathedral Organist to the Cathedral Organ and the musical aspects of worship at the Cathedral.

Choral Scholars, either fulltime or part-time, may also be organ scholars if they apply for and are awarded both scholarships.

All Scholars are obliged to take lessons from an approved professional tutor in their chosen field of music. These lessons should be paid for by the Scholar/Parent/Guardian and financially assisted by the Scholarship award.
