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The Parish of Enniskillen

The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

Over the summer we saw the Olympics. This brings to mind a number of New Testament letters referring to sport, including Hebrews: 'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let



us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith' (Hebrews 12:1-2).

The Christian life is compared to a long-distance race, but despite the struggles and obstacles, there is a great crowd of witnesses cheering us on. We have a heavenly Father who loves us and a Saviour who has run the race before us. If we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, He will enable us to finish the race.

During the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, the British athlete Derek Redmond was running in the semi-finals of the 400 metres. About 250 metres from the finish his hamstring tore. He fell to the ground in pain and stretcher bearers came over to him. However, Redmond was determined to finish the race and so he started hopping toward the finishing line. Suddenly Jim Redmond, Derek's father, ran out of the stands towards him. "You don't have to do this," he told his son. "Yes, I do," said Derek, to which his father said, "We're going to finish this together." They completed the lap with Derek leaning on his father's shoulder. As they crossed the finish line, the spectators rose to give

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Derek a standing ovation. Although he did not win an Olympic medal, Derek Redmond finished the race with his father at his side. In our race of life let us make sure we keep our eyes on the finishing line the finishing line might be closer than we realise! Let us not forget the encouragement we have to finish the race, and let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, and the prize he has promised us of eternal life! Let us also not forget others who like Derek might be struggling along the race of life! Many people and their lifestyles are continually changing and not all for the better of the Christian Church. There are many families living in the Enniskillen area who now have no church connections – children are not being baptised, civil marriages, and non-religious funerals. If God has become less relevant in peoples' lives where is the hope for the future? And I

am not just thinking of their future in this world but their future in the next world! This is a growing factor, and everyone needs to be on the alert not to fall victim to growing secularism!

We need to be faithful to God and show that faithfulness in our everyday life and to be a regular attender (if able) at church. Stay connected, connect, or reconnect but do not disconnect! A Sunday or two at church missed, leads to three or four missed, and in turn leads on to months missed, and finally to years, and at that stage reconnections are hard to make – then secularism wins!

With the ministry we offer in St Macartin's Cathedral no one should feel judged by their circumstance or feel 'left out in the cold' – we are open and available to welcome everyone regardless of situation or circumstance! You may know better than I know, of people who feel weary with life, troubled with one problem or another, have felt isolated or hurt by others, and need help on the race of life. These are the ones you need to extend the hand of friendship to and assure them that they are valued and welcome in our Cathedral –

As we begin the Autumn season, please make this widely known and invite others you know to join or re-join our church.

St Macartin's Mothers' Union Celebrates 120 Years

Our Branch was formed in March 1904 with 60 members. The first Diocesan President, 1904-1919, was the Countess of Belmore, Anne Elizabeth Honoria. She was the wife of the 4th Earl of Belmore and had 13 children. On 2-09-2001 our Branch Banner was dedicated by the then Bishop, the Rt Rev BDA Hannon. The Rector, Precentor Brian Courtney, conducted the service and the lesson was read by Mrs Avril Kee. The Banner is a blue damask trimmed with gold fringing. The Diocesan Banner was designed and made by Brown's of Manchester in 1963 and is kept in St Macartin's Cathedral Enniskillen. In 1996 this Banner survived a fire in the Cathedral which gutted a large area at the back of the Church.

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Choral Scholarships

If you have the talent and interest, you can help to form an integral part of St Macartin's Cathedral Choir, Enniskillen, and benefit from our new choral scholarships.

The Cathedral Choir sings at the weekly Sunday morning service at 11.00am, and occasionally at additional services throughout the year. Once or twice a year, the Choir visits churches and cathedrals further afield, to sing. Each year, commencing in September, St Macartin's offers up to ten Choral Scholarships; ideally at least two of each



voice part (Soprano, Alto, Tenor, Bass). It is useful, but not essential, for potential Choral Scholars to have relevant experience of singing in a choir, for example a church, school or community choir. For all Scholars, good sightreading skills are desirable.

There are three types of scholarship available: Choral Scholar (Fulltime), Choral Scholar (Part-time) and Organ Scholar.

- Fulltime Choral Scholars receive an annual scholarship of £500 to assist with costs of tuition.
- Part-time Choral Scholars receive an annual scholarship of £250 to assist with costs of tuition.
- Organ Scholars receive an annual scholarship of £100 to assist with costs of tuition and have use of the Cathedral Organ for practice purposes provided the cathedral is available at the time and prior booking of the organ for practice has been made. Organ Scholars will also receive some introductory sessions from the Cathedral Organist to the



Cathedral Organ and the musical aspects of worship at the Cathedral.

Choral Scholars, either fulltime or part-time, may also be organ scholars if they apply for and are awarded both scholarships.

All Scholars are obliged to take lessons from an approved professional tutor in their chosen field of music. These lessons should be paid for by the Scholar/Parent/Guardian and financially assisted by the Scholarship award.

Messy Church

Messy Church is held on the third Thursday of each month from 4.00-6.00pm. Dates are 17th October, 21st November and 19th December. The rule is: no child without an adult, and no adult without a child. Now that we're in a new school year, we are look-



ing forward to meeting new friends! So even if you've never been before, even if you or your children aren't parishioners of the Cathedral, you are very welcome to join us!

Sunday Lights and Café

Sunday Lights and Café, at which we use interactive and creative forms of learning to help the children learn about the Christian faith (telling Bible stories, discussion, songs,



games, and crafts), will return in the Sundays following "Back to Church Sunday". Registration forms will be available, and should be completed, following the "Back to Church Sunday" service. From Sunday 29th September onwards, the children will leave during the 11.00am service after the singing of a family hymn for their own activities, and will attend and take part in monthly Family Services. The first Family Service of the new programme (after "Back to Church Sunday") will be held on 27th October. Sunday Lights is open to anyone in P1-4, and Sunday Café welcomes children in P5-Year 8.

Confirmation



A Confirmation Service will be held during Eastertide 2025 for young people of Year 9 and above. Those who expect to be confirmed should regularly attend services with their families. Confirmation is about taking your place within the life and mission of the Church. Application forms for Confirmation are available in the Parish Office for those who wish to be confirmed. Please collect and return them as soon as possible. Details of Confirmation Classes will be released in due course.

On moving back to Enniskillen in 1996 we joined the congregation at Saint Macartin's.

I served in the Royal Air Force for nineteen years and on leaving have been employed in Local Government and the NHS in a variety of audit, safety, governance and risk management roles. I presently am employed in Civil Contingencies as the Resilience Manager for the Southern area of Northern Ireland, project managing multi agency partners in preparing, responding and recovering from any emergencies that may or indeed does occur.

I have been part of the Pipe Band movement for many decades, joining Killadeas Pipe Band at eleven years old and continuing on playing with the Pipes and Drums of the Royal Air Force, as well as playing with a number of other bands. I also have been involved in the Fermanagh Section of RSPBANI for many years as Secretary and more lately as Treasurer, it has been a real delight to be involved with the great team who contribute so much to bringing the County Fermanagh Championships to Enniskillen year on year. I feel very privileged to serve as the Chairman of the County Fermanagh Branch of the Royal Air Forces Association for the past fifteen years, we are a small but incredibly active group who strive hard to be very much a part of the community and ensure every member of the RAF family in Fermanagh and more widely receives our help if in need. This year is the 75th anniversary of the County Fermanagh Branch, which was formed on the 15th of March 1949, we were very proud indeed to be the host for the recent D Day commemoration service in our Cathedral which was a really poignant and moving occasion. I have been on the Board of the Arts Council NI since 2022, a role I greatly enjoy and which allows me to make a small contribution to the wider Arts world.

Our wedding day and the birth of our two wonderful children.




Bible Reading Notes





Psalm

Psalm 88

There are times when all of us feel overwhelmed by the darkness. When there seems to be no hope and no solution to our problems. For the Jewish people as a nation these feelings reached a peak when they were carried into exile in Babylon: they left familiarity and



home behind, they left their beloved temple, for the most part they left their friends and families to be taken forcibly to a life of suffering far from home. Their sense that God had abandoned them comes through clearly in their writings, and in this psalm in particular. They felt shunned by those around them, isolated, without hope. And their pain is palpable: they cry out in different ways at different times in their plight. All options have been exhausted.

When we too feel without hope and without words to express our pain then we can turn to passages like Psalm 88, where we can learn how to pray in crisis, where we can find permission to be in the dark depths, without judgement. We can learn that we are not alone in despair. The exceptional and extreme nature of this psalm is the key to its power. Psalm 88 seems to offer nothing else, and yet the hope is that the psalm still does appeal to God in the midst of the darkness. The most remarkable thing about this psalm is that it has been written at all. As people of faith we are uncomfortable with the whole text: every other psalm of lament ends on a note of redemption, a note of obvious hope. But here the hope is more subtle: the fact that the psalm exists is the expression of hope. The psalm is not shallow or unempathetic: it knows and feels real pain, real abandonment, and yet it knows somehow that these are moments to offer to God, that God is still in the midst of these moments.

It would be wrong to think of this psalm as a prediction of the crucifixion,

but it certainly captures some of the heart pain, shunning and abandonment that Jesus expressed as he approached the cross. The love shown on the cross was is no way conventional, or expected, and similarly the conundrum of feeling abandoned by God, yet engaging in dialogue with God is the mystery right at the heart of the crucifixion and Psalm 88.

When we stand in hopeless, utter darkness, we do not stand alone: we stand with the writer of Psalm 88, and we stand with Christ on the cross.



Psalms 88:18 KJV Lover and friend hast thou put far from me, and mine acquaintance into darkness.

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Knowing your Cathedral - The East Window

The Church has taught since ancient times that Eden was in the East, and that the second coming of Christ will happen in the East, and so the special significance of this cardinal direction for church buildings is marked in many ways. In St. Macartin's Cathedral we have a splendid East Window which draws on this tradition by depicting four scenes of resurrection from the Bible. Our curate, Revd Edwin, will be writing about each of these scenes over the coming months.

The final panel depicts the resurrection of Christ himself. In the first three panels we have moved from one just dead, to one on his way to be buried, to one who had been dead for three days: this increasing power of Christ over death as he went through his ministry culminates in him conquering death in his own body. In common with the gospel accounts






of Jesus' resurrection, the actual moment itself is not depicted, but the window shows Mary Magdalene's very human and gentle encounter with the newly-risen Christ. He reminds her not to touch his body until he has ascended to heaven. How human and how poignant: of course he

could have ascended earlier, avoided Mary altogether until afterwards, but he knew it was likely that she would come to the tomb as early as possible to weep near his body, and he waited there for her. Even in the greatest moment of history, God waits for the individual, sits with their pain, acknowledges their grief, blesses them with God's presence. Mary's part was simply to be faithful, to trustingly present herself and her pain to Jesus, in the peace and solitude of the garden. And her blessing was to be the first of the apostles: the earliest person sent to take the good news of the resurrection to the world. The final bit of earthly humanity in the story is that of course the first people she told, the eleven disciples, didn't believe her. Photographs by **Dr Willie Holmes**


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Parish Organisations
